Dear Friends

The Platinum Jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth 11

As a nation, in April we celebrated the Queen's 96th birthday. She is the longest reigning monarch in British history (70 years compared with Victoria's 63 years). Up until recently she attended church every week and did a full week's work!

It is her commitment to serving God and the nation which stands out in her life. Even before she became Queen, she made a promise, which she has kept for over 75 years: *'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service'* (21st birthday broadcast, 21 April 1947).

What is the secret of the Queen's consistency of character and service? In 2002 she said this: *'I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God.'* Here are wise words from somebody who draws her strength from the Christian Faith and inspiration for those of us who want to make our lives count!

The Queen has been an example of joyful, wise, and generous service on behalf of others all her life. Six months before her coronation she asked the nation and commonwealth to *'pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life.'*

Clearly, God has answered those prayers!!

Pentecost

As well as our Jubilee Celebrations between 2nd and 5th June, the Church also celebrates the Feast of Pentecost - the outpouring of the Holy Spirit - on Sunday, 5th June. It's a somewhat sad fact that to many people today the Holy Spirit is the least well known of the three Persons of the Trinity. David Watson, one time Canon of York Minster, commented ruefully, "If God were to have removed his Holy Spirit from the Early Church, 96% of what they were doing would have ceased immediately. If God were to remove his Holy Spirit from the Church today, hardly anyone would notice the difference." We need only to read the Book of Acts in the Bible to see the difference the Holy Spirit made. Those who were so afraid that they met in secret behind locked doors rushed out into the street to tell all who were in Jerusalem about the love of God, the death and resurrection of Jesus and the Good News of the forgiveness of sins. Peter, who not many weeks earlier, had denied that he knew Jesus, preached a sermon so powerful that 3,000 people became Believers. The sick were healed, and many people joined the Church, marvelling, "See how these Believers love one another". We sometimes forget that Holy Spirit is available to all Believers today. It is the Spirit who enables us to understand more about Jesus, who gives us the strength to live the way God wants us to live our lives, who produces within us love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, humility and self-control. You may like to pray the words of a well-known hymn: -

'Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me.

Break me, melt me, mould me, fill me.

Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me.'

Please note that is event replaces our usual Community Hub. We hope all our Hub friends will join us between 12.30pm and 3pm


Deanery Living in Love and Faith courses

Amongst other things the cabinets for both the Book of Remembrance and the Memorial Book are evidence of his handiwork. Very outgoing and full of fun Gary organised our Church Garden Parties for many years. We remember the Punch and Judy shows and the train that ran around Gooseholme.

Family was hugely important to Gary - and so was football! He enjoyed nothing more than joining his four sons, Daniel, Matthew, Christian and Alex on the terraces of Preston North End Football Club.


As a Funeral Director, Gary was amazing. Nothing was too much trouble for him, and the fact that so many Kendal families have returned to Hayes and Parkinson on the death of loved ones over the years is in no small part a tribute to the care that he gave.

Our former Vicar, Canon Dr Alan Billings, made the unusual step of returning to the Parish for Gary's funeral. He said, "As you may know, there is an understanding that once a vicar has left his or her parish, they do not return. I have tried to keep to that over the years. I've made an exception today because for the 14 years I was the vicar here I saw Gary pretty well every week. He was a server on Sunday, carrying the cross. Most of the funerals I took here were arranged by him. And he did many acts of kindness for me whenever I needed some practical help at church or at the vicarage. And every year, on my birthday, he would phone me up and tell me how things were in Kendal and at St George's. He was a good friend. I'm sure you have similar memories."

May Gary rest in peace and rise in glory.



This year Her Majesty The Queen became the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee marking 70 years of service to the people of the United Kingdom, the Realms and the Commonwealth.

Celebrations will include **The Queen's Birthday Parade (Trooping the Colour)** on 2nd June when more than 1,400 parading soldiers, 200 horses and 400 musicians will come together. Beginning at Buckingham Palace, the Parade will move down The Mall to Horse Guard's Parade, joined by Members of the Royal Family on horseback and in carriages. The Parade will close with the traditional RAF fly-past, watched by The Queen and Members of the Royal Family from the Buckingham Palace balcony.

Platinum Jubilee Beacons: The United Kingdom's long tradition of celebrating Royal Jubilees, Weddings and Coronations with the lighting of beacons will also continue. Over 1,500 beacons will be lit throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories.



SAINT OF THE MONTH

In this regular feature we explore the lives of some lesser well-known saints whose feast day falls during the current month.

3rd June The Martyrs of Uganda

The Ugandan Church had dozens of martyrs within just ten years of Christianity arriving there. At first, it had gone so well: the first Anglican missionaries arriving in Uganda in 1877 were welcomed by the Kabaka (king) of Buganda, Mutesa. Mutesa also welcomed the Roman Catholics and Muslim Arabs, and, being a natural diplomat, retained his power by cleverly playing off the three groups against each other. His son, Mwanga II, who became king about 1883, was very different. Mwanga II wanted to retain absolute power, and deeply resented the missionaries and new converts, whom he felt were giving their allegiance to Christianity, instead. And so it was that on 31st January 1885 he ordered the execution of Yusufu (Joseph) Rugarama, Makko (Mark) Kakumba, and Nuwa (Noah) Serwanga. That October, even the Anglican Bishop, James Hannington, was murdered.

When Joseph Mukasa Balikuddembe, a senior advisor to the king and a Catholic convert, condemned Mwanga for ordering Hannington's death, Mwanga had him arrested. Mukasa became the first Catholic martyr on 15th November 1885, when he was beheaded at Nakivubo. Between December of 1885 and May of 1886 many more converts were murdered. The crisis came in May, when Mwanga ordered all the converts to choose between Christianity and complete obedience to his orders. (Mwanga had been furious and humiliated when the Christian pages in his own court refused his homosexual advances; it was unheard of to deny the king anything.)

Courageously, the young Christians chose their faith. And so it was that 26 pages were wrapped in straw and burned to death at Namugongo on 3rd June, 1886. In the following months, many other Christians throughout the country died by spear or fire for their faith. They included two Christians who were in the king's court, Joseph Mukasa Balikuddembe and Charles Lwanga. Both had rescued royal pages from Mwanga's sexual advances. The last Christian to die in this persecution was Jean-Marie Muzeeyi, beheaded at Mengo on 27th January 1887. The final list of 45 known Protestant and Catholic martyrs includes only those who could be formally accounted for. The end result of the Namugongo martyrdoms was directly opposite to Mwanga's intentions. The sight of these young Ugandan Christians, who could die singing hymns and praying for their enemies, inspired many bystanders. They wanted to know about such a faith as this. Within a few years Christianity had taken firm root in Uganda.
