

### Letter from Rev Melanie Greenall, Minister at Sandylands and Stricklandgate Methodist Churches

#### **Dear Friends**

2024 is one of those years when time moves on pretty sharpish as a minister: There's hardly time to draw breath after saying goodbye to the shepherds and wise men for another year before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 14th.

The baby in a manger of our nativity scenes didn't stay that way forever but grew into a man who would astound all with his words and his actions; causing fear and anger in the authorities of his day but inspiring worship in others.

According to the New Testament, before he began his ministry Jesus spent time alone in the desert deciding on how best to fulfil his mission. Christians reflect on this during Lent which isn't just a time to give up chocolate, alcohol or something else. Rather it's a time to consider all that Jesus grew up to become and teach; to reflect on his message of good news and his definition of what that might mean (his manifesto you might call it).

As we reflect, we consider how poorly we follow Christ's example in the way we live our lives today. Yet even then, 'when our hearts are far way, God's love goes further still' as a modern song puts it.

In coming weeks no doubt there will be countless cards signed with loving kisses: some expressing genuine affection, others may be sent in a less serious vein. However the kiss I long to receive is the one described by a 19th century hymn writer, speaking of God's love: 'Here is love vast as an ocean....heaven's peace and perfect justice kissed a guilty world with love'

### Letter from Rev. Jean Radley Associate Priest Beacon Team

**Dear Friends** 

As this is the first magazine letter of the New Year may I wish you all a blessed 2024. It will be an exciting year for the Beacon Team as we welcome (we hope!) our new Incumbent. Please pray that the Priest of God's choosing will be appointed – and, of course, the new Team Rector will need our prayers.

This month both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day! The link between the two can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. (Luke 4:1-13). First he was tempted to turn stones into bread. Yet, using words from the Scriptures, Jesus said that loving God and His word comes before satisfying physical desires.

Satan then tempted Jesus to worship him. Again Jesus used words of Scripture, emphasising that worshipping God is an expression of loving God and serving Him.

Jesus was then tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple – Satan assured him that he would not come to any harm. This would impress the crowds and make Jesus an instant celebrity. Quoting Scripture for the third Jesus once more firmly refused to give in to this temptation. Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practical ways, as we follow Jesus in the in the way of the Cross. We see this clearly demonstrated in the life and death of Saint Valentine.

Valentine was a Christian who demonstrated the importance of sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Century AD and that he was martyred on 14<sup>th</sup>February. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so had attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret, which is why today we celebrate our love for one another on his day.

I do hope that you will be able to join us in worship on Ash Wednesday and also join our Lent Bible Studies on Monday afternoons at St George's or Friday evenings at Burneside. More details will be found in our weekly news sheets.

While at Christmas Lunch with Auntie being taken to see Father Christmas.



### **Totters and Bumps and Babies**

#### **Totters**

A very lively popular and friendly group which attracts between 40-50 toddlers plus adults every Monday 9 - 11am. It runs in term time only. The group is run primarily by a team of 5 volunteers. We provide support for the adults as well as activities for the children. Drinks for adults included in the fee. There are plenty of toys (large

and small), sit and ride toys, art and crafts, tuff tray messy activities, play dough, sand and sometimes a bouncy castle etc. We also have a quieter room for adults and children who find the other rooms too noisy and busy. The session ends with a healthy snack and a singing time.

### **Cornerstone Bumps and Babies (CBBs)**

This small and friendly group runs in term time only on a Monday afternoon from 1.30 - 3pm. It is run by 2 volunteers. We have between 6 - 14 babies from birth to 1 year old plus adults attend on a regular basis. We offer friendship, advice and support to the adults. This is a safe place to come and experience the highs and lows of being a new parent. We attract mums, couples, dads and grandparents (and particularly when mum returns to work) We have play mats, rugs etc for the tiny babies and good quality, safe and stimulating toys and a ball pool for the babies to play with as they begin to sit up, move and eventually walk. There is opportunity to weigh the babies as well. Included in the low price is a choice of hot and cold drinks and a selection of lovely homemade cakes or biscuits.
